Module Aims

This module aims to:

- Recognise the role and purpose of planning and how it is organised.
- Explain why policy is required and at what level it is best developed.
- Describe the main policies and policy issues, within a sustainability context, relating to housing, urban regeneration, transportation, the environment, conservation, retailing and the countryside.
- Recognise the main policy responses to contemporary planning issues and a critical analysis of them.
- Recognise how to draw on the key planning principles and policies which could be applied in different geographic locations.

Module topics

• The organisation and processes of planning

The organisations and process of planning, the role of central government in the planning process, the local authorities and the public.

Sustainability and the development plan process

Sustainable development is the core principle underpinning planning.

Development control

The statutory background and applications for planning permission and other statutory consent.

- Environmental Impact Assessment
- Planning obligations and Community Infrastructure Levy

Measures used to secure financial contributions from developers to support a new development.

Policy implementation – larger than local

Factors which necessitate spatial strategic planning in long-term planning, including the advantages and disadvantages of long-term strategic planning.

Policies for housing

Discuss factors that influence supply and demand for housing including important current and emerging housing policy issues in the UK and sustainable approaches to development.

Urban containment and housing regeneration

Land release and the location of large-scale new housing developments, guided by the development plan and policies, while addressing the related issues of greenfield, brownfield sites and statutory green belt land.

Policies for the rural environment

Sustainable policies and practices for the protection and enhancement of the natural environment in rural areas.

Policies for retail

The statutory planning system through the development plan, regulatory policies, stringent 'sequential and impact testing', guiding the location of specific retail uses in the retail sector, and the impact of the emergence of a range of social media on the physical form of the built environment.

This content will be reviewed and updated regularly to reflect the legal, moral and financial changes in professional standards and practice.
